### forthcoming and recently published papers

<u>The Enduring Case for Fertility Desires</u> is the title of **Sara Yeatman's** forthcoming paper, out in the December issue of *Demography*. Using data from Malawi, her team demonstrates the predictive validity of numeric fertility timing desires over both four-month and one-year periods; interesting graphs and tables – check it out!

Ryan Masters, along with coauthor Dan Powers (UT-Austin) explores the

effectiveness of resolving disagreements over APC model results, which are robust to researcher manipulation, in their newly published paper <u>Clarifying assumptions in age-period-cohort analyses and validating results</u> in *PLOS ONE*.



Did you know that Bangladeshi women are more likely to marry after a heat wave? In fact, marrying a daughter is used by some families as a strategy to cope with climate shocks. **Amanda Carrico**, along with her coauthors, investigate this connection further in their paper <u>Extreme Weather and Marriage among Girls and Women in Bangladesh</u>, in *Global Environmental Change*.

The team on Local Health Systems in Honduras, which includes coauthors **Krister Par Andersson, Jane Menken, Bertha Bermudez Tapia**, and others, just published a paper in *Health Policy and Planning* entitled "Organizations matter in local governance: evidence from health sector decentralization in Honduras".
