
COVID-19 media coverage

As you may know, **jimi adams'** COVID-19 modeling team updates Governor Jared Polis on a weekly basis concerning the status of the coronavirus here in Colorado, while their modeling projection reports are *scheduled* to be released every 3 weeks; however, since coronavirus infections in Colorado have been currently trending *strongly in the wrong direction*, his team has been releasing reports much more frequently now. Their <u>latest modeling report</u> indicates that if Colorado remains on the current trajectory, we will likely surpass the April peak in hospitalizations for COVID-19 by mid-November, which exceeded 900 in one day! Check out the team's latest COVID-19 findings on the Colorado Dept. of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) press release website.

Here's a data snapshot of our state's running totals, as of this morning:

0 - 19 years

- 142,402 cases, 10,538 hospitalized, 2,201 deaths due to COVID-19
- Boulder County has had a total of 7,425 cases and 98 deaths.
- The World Health Organization (WHO) recommends the positivity rate be at or below 5% to contain the virus; Colorado is currently at an alarming **11.13%**.

Their project is a spin-off of the "tiny town" research funded by NICHD. The pilot project examines spatial and temporal trends in elderly mortality rates and extreme environmental events across rural America. They are also developing a proposal for the Rocky Mountain Research Data Center (RMRDC) to access restricted data allowing examination of this association at scales finer than the county.
