## recently published papers



Using data from a large sample of interviews with Texas prisoners, which were conducted a week preceding their release, and then reinterviewed 10 months later upon leaving prison, **David Pyrooz**, along with coauthor Scott Decker (ASU) were able to develop a theoretical model, examining continuity and change in activism and radicalism intentions of those prisoners. Their findings are presented in their paper <u>The imprisonment-extremism nexus: Continuity and change in activism and radicalism intentions in a longitudinal study of prisoner reentry</u>, published in *PLoS One*.

HOT off the press! Published in PLoS One is Scott Ortman's coauthored paper Cities: Complexity, theory and history.

Adam Lippert and coauthors have been exploring the many factors that play a role in young adults' BMI (Body Mass Index), reflected in their new paper <u>The Relative Contributions of Socioeconomic and Genetic Factors to Variations in</u> <u>Body Mass Index Among Young Adults</u>, published in *American Journal of Epidemiology*.

In a recent Daily Camera article <u>"In public health, personal responsibility message touted by Boulder County, others has mixed success</u>", **Stef Mollborn** and **Lori Peek** lend their expertise about the hard realities of public health and personal responsibility during this pandemic.

"What worries me is when we only talk about what individuals can be doing, that's not something that's the kind of multilevel solution that's going to get us through this thing," says Mollborn.

And this past week, **Stef** and PhD Sociology student **Josh Goode** were interviewed by *The Colorado Daily* about their research on digital technology use and the effects on children: <u>"CU Boulder study shows screen time for children should</u> <u>not worry parents"</u>. **Ade Modile** is also part of this research team. Touching on the same vein in *CU Boulder Today's* recent article, <u>Parental restrictions on childhood tech use have few lasting effects</u>, **Stefanie** and **Josh** continue to point out that their data suggests most American teens are not becoming irrevocably addicted to technology after all.
