The state of Texas requires pregnant women under the age of 18, who are seeking abortion without parental consent, to go to court with an attorney to petition a judge for permission to obtain abortion. However, research conducted by CUPC affiliates **Amanda Stevenson** (Boulder) and <u>Kate Coleman-Minahan</u>, (Asst. Prof. at College of Nursing-Anschutz) explores how the Texas courts constrain attorneys' ability to represent minors through politicization. You can read all about it in their recently published paper "Judicial bypass attorneys' experiences with abortion stigma in Texas courts" in *Social Science & Medicine*.



If you recall back in August, CUPC Highlights celebrated this insightful video art project <u>"Twin Cities Torn Apart,"</u> created by **Bertha Bermúdez Tapia** and Mexican artist <u>Mario Jiménez-Díaz</u>, which drew some early attention when it debuted on *YouTube*. We're proud to announce that **Kate Coleman-Minahan's** research <u>Medication abortion among young</u> <u>people: A community-based participatory research study in four states</u> was funded **\$620,667** by the <u>Society of Family Planning Research Fund</u> (SFPRF). SFPRF received 63 eligible proposals and after a very competitive process, only nine were selected for funding. ~ Way to go Kate!

Joel Hartter and Lori Hunter received "high-five" news that their NSF proposal "<u>Adaptive Human Migration in Changing</u> <u>Environments: Using Recent Empirical Patterns to Inform Forecasts Under Climate and Socioeconomic Futures</u>" led by Jon Salerno (CSU) has been recommended for funding in the amount of **\$400,000** by the Human-Environment and Geographical Sciences (HEGS) Program.
