This award recognizes outstanding achievements in research, teaching and service for the public good, and comes with a **\$1,000 research grant**! Scott, who focuses on indigenous partnerships and collaborative synthesis in archaeology, was cited for his outstanding work related to the <u>Social Reactors Project</u>. newly funded grants



Woah! Bravo to <u>Amanda Carrico</u>, whose research team, led by <u>Keith Musselman</u> (CU - <u>INSTAAR</u>), was awarded **\$3.6M** through NSF's Growing Convergence Research program! This grant will support critical research into the **effects of population growth and climate change on mountain headwater systems in Colorado.** The team will gather data about the public's values and priorities regarding land management. forthcoming and recently published papers

Our affiliate <u>Mara Goldman</u>, a political ecologist, has been living in Portugal this past year, on sabbatical, while working on EU grants with colleagues at the <u>Center for International Studies (CEI)</u>, <u>University Institute of Lisbon</u> (ISCTE), where she has an affiliation as an integrated researcher. With a focus on pastoral communities related to climate change, Mara has worked for over two decades in East Africa, specifically with Maasai tribes in Tanzania and Kenya, as well as in India. Two newly published papers reflect her exploration into these societies and their relationship with wildlife conservation, rangeland management, and gender dynamics:

- 1. <u>Women's stories and knowledge of wildlife and conservation practice in northern Tanzania and South India, in the</u> journal *Oryx*
- 2. "People should also look after the people": relational values of wildlife and collectively titled land in Ilkisongo Maasai group ranches in Southern Kenya, in Ecology and Society.
- ~ fascinating work Mara way to go!

UC Denver affiliate <u>Karen Spencer</u>, who incidentally serves on CUPC's Executive Committee, has produced some excellent research on end-of-life decision making while addressing the challenges of gatekeeping, with its many forms, in modern healthcare settings. Read her latest study here: <u>Unpacking gatekeeping in medical institutions: A case study of access to end-of-life patients</u>, published in *Qualitative Research*.

Also, Karen and her colleagues examine how the recent shift away from **qualitative** research, and more towards **quantitative** methods, when studying the dynamics between race and health, substantially limits the knowledge being produced. They explain why in their new article <u>Sociological contributions to race and health</u>: <u>Diversifying the</u> <u>ontological and methodological agenda</u>, published in *Sociology of Health and Illness*.



What happens when research from the Anschutz campus collides with the CU Boulder campus? BIG WAVES! Coauthors **Erin Kelly** (Anschutz), **Colleen Reid** (CU Boulder), along with several other colleagues, collaborated on the manuscript Assessment of Rural-Urban and Geospatial Differences in Perceived Handgun Access and Reported Suicidality Among Youth in Colorado, published in *JAMA Network*. Their findings continue to make progress in the prevention of youth firearm injuries.

Figure: Colorado counties with at least one school identified as potentially at high risk of youth suicides. Schools meeting this definition had both prevalence of easy handgun access and prevalence of students planning a suicide attempt in the last year in the top quartile. High-risk counties are in pink.

Archeologist "Rock Star" **Scott Ortman** continues to put the clues together from pieces of the past with two new articles:

- 1. <u>Provisioning an Early City: Spatial Equilibrium in the Agricultural Economy at Angkor, Cambodia,</u> featured in the *Journal of Archeological Method and Theory.*
- 2. Artifact density and population density in settlement pattern research, in the Journal of Archeological Science.
